

VICTORIA DAY AT GRENFELL

Good Sports and a Large Crowd—
Speedy Indian Cyclists.

Grenfell, Sask., May 26.—Ideal weather, with a splendid programme of sports brought to Grenfell for the Victoria Day celebration one of the largest holiday crowds seen here in many years. Special train carried hundreds from Broadview, Summerberry, Wolseley, Sintaluta and Indian Head, including the Philharmonic society from the latter place. A five mile Marathon road race brought out nine contestants, including two from Regina, but two sturdy Indians from the Sakimay reserve came first and second, Paul Akooz and Panipeuekic, respectively, with E. Giles, of Summerberry, third. The time was 28 minutes, and at the finish the Indians were quite fresh. Efforts are being made to bring them out in the Regina road race, as it is believed they can easily out-class any one in the west.

Cricket, baseball, lacrosse and football matches were played and resulted as follows: Junior lacrosse—Wolseley and Grenfell, won by the former. League football—Broadview and Grenfell, a tie, both teams being evenly matched. Baseball—Wolseley and Indian Head, won by Indian Head by a margin of two runs after a close and exciting game. The lacrosse match between Grenfell and Wolseley, was won by the latter by 3 to 4, but a good deal of rough play characterized the game.

The Broadview brass band gave selections during the day, and a grand display of fireworks followed by the comic opera, "The Pirates of Penzance," presented by the Indian Head Philharmonic society in the rink, which was crowded, brought the day's programme to a close.
